

Hi! My name is Lucia Carlson, and I am a senior in high school. I am a part of Holy Spirit Parish and am an alumni of Marquette Catholic School. I have been on many of the Camp Survive, Camp Covecrest, and Steubenville conference trips over the years and every one of these trips have contributed to my relationship with God and the desire to spread the Catholic faith to others. Having things that fostered my faith early on, and being open to God's will, allowed the seed of mission work and evangelization to be planted on my heart.

I had been praying about wanting to do mission work for years, and about wanting to spread Jesus' love and truth to people. I have felt God telling me that this is something He wanted me to do. Unexpectedly, I was presented with an opportunity to travel to Cambodia to do mission work. I felt no hesitation in saying "yes" but didn't know how everything would work out. It took a lot of trust in God that He would put pieces of my life into place so that I could go on this mission trip. I kept trusting that He would either make this happen or take it away if it wasn't meant to be. I kept saying "yes" to the next steps in the planning process, and the next thing I knew I was in Cambodia, with people I had never met, ready to do whatever the Davidson family, who had established a mission there, needed us to do.

Only 0.5% of Cambodians are Catholic. It is a mostly Buddhist country and many of its population have never even heard about Jesus. This, along with language barriers can make it difficult to share the faith in the ways we may want to such as preaching. The Davidson's are doing amazing things in Cambodia. The missionary that they have established is so beautiful and truly shows what it's like to love how Jesus loves. A big part of the Davison's missionary approach is to meet people where they are at, love them as Jesus loves, and be an example of Christ in everything that you do.

A couple of the projects the girls and I helped with while there was painting church railings for the only Catholic Church in Siem Reap and painting walls at a Pastoral Home for kids and teens. An interesting while attending Mass in Cambodia is that you sit on the floor during mass! The men mixed and poured cement at a school and cleared a lot of debris out of a woman's yard. These projects made me realize the lack of resources for many Cambodians. They don't have access to the same tools and technologies that we do which assist us and make our lives easier. They live very different lives from us and many of us wouldn't even be able to imagine living how they do. It was a big culture shock for me seeing the way that Cambodians live. There is a great amount of poverty and suffering but also great amounts of joy and happiness among the people. Something that I will never forget seeing were beggars with missing limbs due to landmines left over from the genocide during the Khmer Regime. Nearly 25% of Cambodias population was killed during the genocide. Seeing the ongoing affects of this firsthand put into perspective the great suffering this country has faced and what is still a reality for many people. We visited one of the oldest Catholic Churches in Cambodia where evidence of machine gun fire could still be seen on outside of the church.

There are many displaced children in Cambodia who have broken homes or whose families are too poor to care for them. We were able to visit an orphanage where the little kids around the ages 2-5 showed us their progress in learning English.

The orphanage was run by the Missionaries of Charity. We visited the Pastoral Home which is run by a couple who takes care of around 60 displaced kids and teens. We also went to a church at one of the floating villages. Yes, there were whole villages floating on the river! Here we had Mass and some people on the team did medical outreach with sick men, women, and children. Without the medical help the team gave, these people's illnesses would have been left untreated. Sadly, there is a lack of knowledge and resources among Cambodian doctors, so many people don't get proper treatment or no treatment at all. This is just another amazing gift the Davidson's have brought to Cambodia. I had an amazing time at the floating village playing with the children. I had a giant tickle fight with a bunch of the kids, and they helped me count to 5 in Khmer! It was so beautiful seeing the joy on the children's faces. What a gift it was being able to have fun with them. The kids in Cambodia are so starved for love. They will run up to you, hug you, and try in every way to engage with you. It's joyous and heartbreaking at the same time, because all they desire is love. Cambodians are some of the most friendly, happy and loving people I've met despite the suffering all around them.

There is also a culture of lust in Cambodia, so being able to bring love to anyone was a gift to me. A beautiful tradition that the Davidson family started is that every month they give out roses to prostitutes with a loving message attached to it. I am blessed to have been able to be a part of this. Prostitution is embedded in Cambodia's culture. Learning this and seeing how many women are involved in it broke my heart. We had 300 roses with notes on them when we went out into a small section of the streets in Siem Reap, and we had given them all away. We only touched on a small part of the city and could've given out even more. I had mixed feelings during this because I was angry that so many young women were being defiled and used, but I also felt some joy seeing the women's faces light up when receiving a rose knowing nothing was asked of them in return other than to know they are loved.

I was able to do many other things and had extraordinary experiences that I will carry with me throughout my life. I was so blessed and hope to continue to bring Christ's love to more people. I especially encourage anyone who has a heart open to mission work to allow the Holy Spirit to guide their path, and trust that if you are open and put the work in, God will direct your steps. Live for the Lord, receive the sacraments often, and be an example of Christ in the world, for even at home you are on mission.

I was so lucky to have met the missionaries from Brainerd whom I journeyed with. Their kindness in allowing me to go with them is a treasure I can never repay. The Davidsons and the other missionaries living in Cambodia were such a beautiful example of people living out their vocation. I will carry their memories with me always! I hope to continue mission work throughout my life and ask for you to pray for all missionaries in the world. 


Jesus' Call in Adoration


Walking With Jesus in the Everyday

I have experienced Jesus love in an overwhelming peace - 8th grade boy


Jesus has given me the gift of deeply knowing Him. I have good conversations with Him - 7th grade girl
